

Glossary

Level 1

Lookout: during war or battles, a person that has the task to control the arrival of the enemies.

To shoot: to hit or kill someone by using a gun.

To gain: to increase the amount of money.

Drummer boy: a young boy that during battles had the task to play a drum in order to advise or to make soldiers walk together.

Thief (thieves): a person who steals something from someone or from a house/place.

To drown: to die in the water because not able to swim.

Surgery: the medical treatment that allows to “repair” the body when there is a part that doesn’t work.

Orphan: an alone child whose parents are dead.

To cling: to be attached somewhere only by the arms.

Level 2

To care: to be interested in someone's life, give support and attention.

Scribe: an employee that has the task to copy some documents.

Sick: a person that doesn't feel well because of an illness.

Delinquent: a person that commits little crimes (usually the term is used for young people that behave in a bad way with others).

Mayor: the elected person to head the municipality of a town/city.

Savior: a person who saves another person that was in a trouble.

(In a) Suction: at the sea, a very dangerous situation due to pressure differences. People or boats in such moments can be covered by water and sunk.

Level 3

To monitor: to check/observe a situation that can suddenly change.

To scold: to blame someone because of something bad that has been done.

To raise: to bring something in a higher position or to start something (for example, to raise alarm means to warn because of a danger).

Reinforcement: make something stronger.

Misunderstanding: not being understood in the right way and for that reason making mistakes.

Bricklayer: a person that builds structures and houses as a job.

To cheer: to acclaim someone for something good that has been done/ to joy for a good event.

Makeshift: something done at the moment in a quick way in order to solve a situation that won't last forever.

To gather: to collect something.

To drag: to pull someone or something in a strong way without the consent.
